

WHAT TO WEAR & WHAT NOT TO WEAR TO AN INTERVIEW

WHAT TO WEAR:

BUSINESS PROFESSIONAL (CORPORATE, CLIENT-BASED ROLE OR INDUSTRY):

- **Suit:** A two-piece suit (pants or skirt) in a dark color (black, navy, or charcoal) works best. Highly recommend getting it dry-cleaned first. (Only button the top button to the suit jacket.) Do a little research to make sure you are following proper suit etiquette.
- Collared Shirt: Make sure it is ironed/pressed, and fits well (no gaps or spaces between the buttons when you sit/stand/twist.) Try lightening up a dark suit with a white or soft-colored shirt. Conservative patterns are fine.
- Conservative Accessories: Your (neck)tie/scarf needs to be a solid color if wearing a
 patterned shirt (and vice versa.) Belts should fit belt loops well, and match shoe color.
- Conservative Jewelry: Wear a *nicer-looking* watch (it doesn't have to *be* expensive, but it should not *look* cheap.) Simple studs (diamond/crystal/cubic zirconia/pearl) are best if you want to wear earrings. A simple mid-length, thin-chained necklace or sophisticated statement necklace is fine.
- Shined Shoes (dress shoes/closed-toe heels): Stick with leather (or leather look-a-like) if you can. Buff out scuff marks prior to your interview. Your shoes need to match your suit and belt. Heels should be a conservative height.
- Matching Colors: Black (shoes & belt) on black or charcoal (suit). Sable brown or black (shoes & belt) on navy blue (suit.) Do not mix and match brown and black. Socks should be a similar or darker color than pants, and shoes should not be a lighter color than socks.



BUSINESS CASUAL (TECH/START-UP/CREATIVE ROLE OR INDUSTRY):

- **Slacks:** Khakis or dark colors are better. Pants should be a non-denim fabric, and paired well with dressier shoes.
- Open-collar shirt, Blouse, or Sweater: Jeweled tones look best (i.e. dark pink, red, blue, dark green, yellow, dark purple etc.) A fun yet classy pattern is more than acceptable here.
- Conservative Dress/Pencil skirt: Stick to thicker fabric that fits well, but isn't *too* form fitting. Opt for a "business" style (little to no flow, neutral/dark color, and a hemline barely above the knees.) A pattern is fine as long as it isn't too distracting.
- **Blazer or Sport Coat:** Can be worn over a dress, collared shirt, or blouse to achieve the *business-casual* look. Try sticking with neutral or darker colors.
- "Pop of color": If pants and shirt/blazer/sweater are more conservative colors, try adding a scarf/tie, cardigan/shirt, or belt of a complimentary (and brighter) color. Example: red & black, yellow & navy/blue, purple & gray
- Classy jewelry: Earrings with a slight/short dangle are acceptable; silver and gold is fine. Save your exotic earrings and bracelets for another time.
- Flats/Heels/Loafer-style shoes: Closed-toe shoes are preferred, "peep toe" would be fine as well. Shoes need to match your outfit in style (business casual.)

WHAT **NOT** TO WEAR:

AVOID WEARING ANY OF THE FOLLOWING TO AN INTERVIEW:

- **Specialized Jewelry:** Avoid wearing more than two rings per hand or more than one earring per ear. Replace face jewelry (lip, nose, eyebrow, etc.) with clear plastic pieces.
- Stiletto heels/Flip Flops/Sandals/Boots/Sneakers: It is not appropriate to wear shoes showing your heels or toes to an interview—especially if your feet are not groomed. Avoid super high heels, sneaker or tennis shoes, and bulky casual-looking boots.
- Bare legs: It is more professional to wear stockings/tights/hosiery; even in humid summer weather. Stockings can be in neutral colors or a similar color to your shoes.
- Out-of-Date Suits: Keep an eye on the lapels (too wide or too narrow), it may be cheaper to pay for alterations than purchase a new suit. Do a little research and make sure you are following proper suit etiquette.



- **Short skirts/Sundresses**: Hemlines should not be more than three inches above the knee. Sundresses are too "flowy" and much too casual.
- **Décolleté:** Avoid low-cut or plunging necklines that enhance cleavage or chest hair.
- **Sleeveless/"Spaghetti straps"**: Try to avoid showing off shoulders in an interview. Opt for lighter material in higher temperatures.
- Capri pants/Leggings: Even if you "dress them up" with a nice shirt or shoes, they are still unacceptable.
- Denim: No jeans or jean jackets. Even chambray shirts may be considered "too casual."
- **Leather jackets/blazers:** Just don't do it. It is tacky, and looks like outerwear.
- Turtlenecks: It isn't 1996. Avoid at least in the first go-around.
- T-shirts: This should go without saying, but just so everyone is clear—no tees. Printed or otherwise classic cotton.
- Wild Nail Polish: Extremely long, dirty, or ungroomed nails are also a turnoff.
- **Perfume or Cologne:** Try to avoid if you can. Some people are very sensitive to scents. Definitely DO wear deodorant, however.
- **Printed or "Trendy" Purses/Pocketbooks/Handbags/Computer bags:** Bags or purses should be a conservative color (black/brown) and inconspicuous.
